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This Annual Report combines *Care for Children's* project activity for both 2021 and 2022, together with financial reports from 2020 and 2021. Going forward our Annual Reports, always printed at the end of the calendar year, will report on the project activity of the year just gone, together with financial information from the latest available audited accounts from the previous year.

# 1 Executive Director's message

Despite 2021 presenting numerous COVID-related challenges, which spilled over into 2022, one of the greatest developments has been the decentralisation of our project management with our Training Manager joining experienced staff from China to form an Asia Regional Team. This team of experts will provide vital support to both existing and new projects across the world.

One of the key project developments over the past two years has been the launch of the Cambodia project. After many emails and online calls, as soon as Cambodia opened up to international travel in January 2022, we travelled to Phnom Penh to sign a Memorandum of Understanding with the Cambodian government. By February the Taylor family had relocated to Phonm Penh from London to lead the project. The Ministry responsible for child welfare services gave us office space in their building, in September we held a two-day joint workshop with the Cambodian government in the south of the country, and by the Autumn Care for Children was registered as an international NGO. On top of this, the first children have already been identified for family placement! It's been a whirlwind for all involved, but we are delighted with the positive progress towards placing orphans and vulnerable children into families in Cambodia as we head into 2023.

We also had some very exciting news out of Thailand in 2021 and 2022 where the Royal Thai government has launched a new policy to ensure all children under six living in residential care are placed into families. This is a landmark shift in their child welfare system, and is precisely the impact

our sustainable project strategy is designed to have. Furthermore, during 2022 we were delighted to establish a partnership with 'The MarCom Pro', a PR agency in Bangkok, to help us develop and launch a national family placement media campaign in partnership with the Ministry of Social Development and Human Security. We now know that the outcome of our work in Thailand to see orphans and vulnerable children placed into local, loving families will long outlive our presence in the country!

In line with Care for Children's new vision to see 'a world of children in families' we have been able to witness the documentary 'Children of Shanghai' receive global attention, with 25 screenings across five countries. It's remarkable to think that the precious stories of changed lives we documented in Shanghai are now giving hope and encouragement to children and families around the world.

Care for Children is seeing increasing demand for help from countries around the world. With up to eight million children still living in residential care, the need is great, but we have proved our model and we're ready to scale! We are building online courses and training programs to supplement our proven model and the amazing work of our training teams. I'm delighted to report that 2021 and 2022 have seen Care for Children's digital training product called 'My Family' achieve key milestones towards its production. 'My Family' will shape a significant part of our strategy going forward. We expect it will open up new opportunities for Care for Children's work, including Singapore where we met with the Ministry of Social and

Family Development in late 2022. As ever, all of this work, time and effort is concentrated on the singular focus to ensure every child has the opportunity to live in a loving family. On behalf of the team at *Care for Children* I greatly appreciate your support and encouragement of our work to serve disadvantaged children.

# **Vision**

To see 'A world of children in families!


# Mission

To serve governments of nations to pioneer a positive alternative to institutional care by placing children into local, loving families in the community (fostering and adoption).

# Model

The core focus of *Care for Children's* work is to retrain institutional childcare staff to become family placement workers in the local community to place children into local families, and subsequently free up space and resources for the local authorities to offer a wider range of childcare services and preventative measures.

Work in partnership with national government authorities for systemic change



### 2. Developmental

Support grassroots implementation with local government to deliver real-time results.



### 3. Sustainable

Develop country-specific training programmes to ensure long-term success.

### **Stakeholders**

### 1. Governments

Care for Children recognises a government's responsibility to protect its citizens. All of Care for Children's country projects are established and managed with an MOU at Ministry level, and implemented with local government.

# 2. Children

Care for Children focusses on seeing children in care moved into families as a positive alternative to institutions. All of Care for Children's work from government relations, to training, to fundraising, is shaped by reaching this goal.

### 3. Families

Care for Children recognises families as the real 'heroes' of family placement work, meaning their support is critical to the success of good, long-term placements. Prospective and experienced families are frequently involved in Care for Children's training activities, together with family care workers.

### 4. Family placement staff


Care for Children's professional approach is based on retraining institutional care staff to become family placement workers who are able to manage the transition of children from residential care into local families, with a particular focus on permanence. This is a specialist field of work within the alternative care spectrum, but the greater, indirect impact (i.e. theory of change) can lead to improved child welfare services and preventative measures for all children.



From 1998, *Care for Children* supported the Chinese government to transition from an institutional care system to a family care model for orphans and vulnerable children. The government took on the responsibility for implementing family care, while *Care for Children* provided consultation and training, empowering government staff to ensure the quality and sustainability of the project.

Care for Children also provided technical support and seed-funding in the way of government matched family allowances (50%) to build models of best practice and design, and deliver a national family care training programme. This empowered the government to enact legislative support for family care in 2015, and by 2018 the Chinese bureau of statistics revealed that over one million vulnerable children were living in families instead of institutions.

Following invitations from a number of governments across Asia, *Care for Children* has also gone on to develop successful programmes with the governments of Thailand and Vietnam.



# **National Strategy**

This enables nationwide, systemic developments to a child welfare system, therefore securing long-term sustainable change, and millions of vulnerable children placed into local, loving families.

# **China**

Since the downsizing exercise of 2020, the China team is now a much smaller office, and has been incorporated into the new Asia Regional Team to support the expansion of *Care for Children's* work into new countries across Asia, including Vietnam, Cambodia and Singapore. Nonetheless, the team organized several training events in China and continued to develop training materials and disseminate updates in childcare policy and practice to social welfare institutions, organizations and government agencies across the country.

The team also continued to maintain key relationships with the five national centres of excellence in family placement in Yinchuan (North), Chengdu (Central), Kunming (South West), Xining (Central), and Datong (North East).

The Department focusses on capacity building of staff, whether it is staff working at Shelters for Children and Families or the Child Welfare Homes we have across Thailand. Thanks to Care for Children for providing training, and imparting knowledge and skills in terms of quality work practices for the practitioners and officials.

# **Thailand**

With the COVID pandemic still ever present, 2021 gave *Care for Children's* Thai team lots of opportunities to learn new skills and become more flexible. Due to restrictions the team was unable to travel around Thailand to train staff from all 77 government Shelters for Children and Families. Instead it was decided to conduct the training online via Zoom, finding ways to persevere through power cuts, weak internet connections and other teething problems! The team missed the deeper connections that face-to-face training affords but were so grateful that hundreds of shelter staff across the country were still able to learn how to run a family care programme. Between September and November 2021, we were delighted to learn that thirteen shelters were able to place 83 children into 76 foster families!

The phrase, 'All children in Thailand belong in safe and nurturing families', not only became the banner to mark the occasion of World Children's Day 2021 and the anniversary of the Declaration of the Rights of the Child, but also the focus for 2022. Partnering with four Child Welfare Homes, sixteen shelters and two like-minded NGOs, this year saw the return of in-person training via 29 workshops to take an even deeper dive into creating mechanisms to ensure that children are afforded every opportunity to grow up and thrive in loving families.

# Vietnam

With Vietnam only coming out of lockdown in April 2022, COVID severely impacted project progress and momentum. Despite this, the team managed to conduct a number of training and coaching sessions, both online and face-to-face when restrictions allowed, to staff at the two pilot social protection centres, government officials, and also child protection officers working within the community.

Having already delivered the full training programme to the family placement teams from the two pilot sites, coaching during 2021 and 2022 focused on the assessment of children for foster care and the assessment of foster carers, as they prepared to move the first children into families.

We are also pleased to report that the government has now confirmed that they will not approve new proposals that involve any form of institutional care for children, and are committed to pursuing family-based alternatives, with institutional care as a last resort!

The Vietnam team also used lockdown as a great opportunity for learning, developing and honing their expertise in family care, as well as conducting an evaluation of the pilot project to inform the project going forward.

# Cambodia

# Overcoming the challenges of COVID

Unsurprisingly, the COVID-19 pandemic impacted *Care for Children's* work in Cambodia with heightened restrictions, including a near full scale lockdown in Phnom Penh in April-May 2021, employees required to work from home if able to do so for most of the year, high restrictions on public gatherings, and high restrictions on foreign nationals coming into the country.

Despite this, during 2021, *Care for Children* was able to establish a permanent presence in Phnom Penh, working closely with the government to register as an international NGO, setting up an office, and agreeing a working partnership to formally launch the project in person the following year. The recruitment of a Project Administrator, to mitigate the challenges arising from not being able to send a Country Manager due to COVID, allowed *Care for Children* to pursue key tasks such as registration and arranging the initial translation of the training materials into Khmer.

## New horizons as restrictions lifted

In January 2022, after COVID restrictions were finally lifted, *Care for Children* was able to send a delegation to Phnom Penh to sign a three-year Memorandum of Understanding with the Ministry of Social Affairs, Veterans and Youth Rehabilitation (MoSVY), signalling the official start of the pilot project and partnership with the Cambodian government. Soon after, Tim Taylor, together with his family, relocated to Phnom Penh to head up the project, and was given permission to work from within the government office, closely collaborating with MoSVY to identify pilot Residential Care Institutions (RCIs) to partner with and to agree on a detailed work plan.

In September 2022 Care for Children organised a conference with all national and sub-national levels of government in order to ensure complete 'buy in' from an early stage, which included identification of the two pilot RCIs. Following the conference, Care for Children was offered office space within the Phnom Penh RCI and also in the sub-national office in Siem Reap, where the other RCI is located. With the training materials translated and contextualised and the needs assessments carried out at both RCIs, the team is looking forward to initiating the training programme with the two RCIs in early 2023, and seeing the first children placed into families!

I have seen first-hand the great work Care for Children has achieved in China. I am delighted that a British organisation is able to support our Cambodian friends.

Since the UK premiere of Children of Shanghai on Sky TV in 2021, the documentary has successfully raised the profile of Care for Children's work and grown the charity's supporter base across the world. Tens of thousands of people have now watched the film in over ten countries through private screenings, TV networks, and online streaming platforms.

Soon after the lifting of global travel restrictions, *Care for Children's* team was invited to screen the documentary across the west coast of the US in November 2021, and then across seven US states in November 2022, attracting audiences from governmental, academic and faith-based institutions, as well as those from the business

sector. In 2022, we were delighted that UBS, one of our key supporters over the last few years, also organised screenings of the documentary in London, Hong Kong and Singapore.

Children of Shanghai has become an extremely effective tool to introduce Care for Children's vision, track record, and methodology in great detail and depth. Both the organisers and the audiences have found the screening of the film to be one of the most engaging and compelling ways to raise awareness of the charity's work.

# Children of Shanghai feature story

Xu Guoqi is a confident young woman, working as a successful events organiser in the bustling Chinese city of Shanghai. She's also an athlete, having represented her country at the Special Olympics, winning a gold medal in the women's 50m breaststroke, a bronze medal in the 4×50m freestyle, and a silver medal in the 100m breaststroke, among many others.

What makes this all the more remarkable is that when she was very young she had severe learning disabilities and could not speak or walk properly. Featured in *Care for Children's* documentary *Children of Shanghai*, she was also one of the very first children to be moved out of an orphanage and placed into a foster family, as part of the first family placement project *Care for Children* set up in 1998.

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She was five when we fostered her, but she was like a one-year-old baby. At first, she was scared about coming into a new family but we tried really hard to build a connection with her. I was busy with work, so her father did almost everything. He changed her nappies and fed her.



# 6 Reflections from the field

# **Vietnam**

I was struck by **how warmly we were** welcomed back to Vietnam. The two years of COVID had been tough on the country, and Social Protection Centres (orphanages) had opened up again for visitors only two months prior to our visit. The government was keen to give a clear message of cooperation, even volunteering to participate in an independent report we are currently undertaking as we near the end of the pilot project stage. It was exciting to see how keen the government is to learn, together with us, on **how best to further progress** family placement developments for orphans and vulnerable children in Vietnam.

# **Thailand**

We recently caught up with one of the family placement workers that *Care for Children* has trained in Southeast Thailand. She told us about a very special foster family that she visited.

"Mrs Mon is a retired teacher and is currently fostering two young brothers, Tong who is 10 and Ti who is 9. As their case worker I can see such a change in the boys since they have been with their foster family. They used to be children who couldn't speak up for themselves, were scared of strangers and never dared to question anyone or let anyone know their needs. But the love and care the boys have received from Mrs Mon is evident, and they are now confident, speak well, and take responsibility with their schoolwork.

"Talking to Mrs Mon about her future and raising the children, she told me: 'If the boys' birth family are not able to take them back, I'm here for them and happy to be their long-term family. My goal is to give them every opportunity while they are part of my family.'

"When I visit her, she loves to pull out her phone and show me photos of the boys and the activities they have been doing. She also recounts the mischief they have been up to, but she tells it with a laugh and a smile. I'm drawn to this dear woman and her love for these boys."

We love that last sentence: 'I'm drawn to this dear woman and her love for these boys'. It's true, love in action is attractive, and often a blessing to be around! We wish Mrs Mon all the very best as she gives up her home and her time to care for vulnerable children in her community.

One day I hope we will have people like Mrs Mon all over Thailand. The attention and love she has for these two brothers has truly transformed their lives.




Care for Children files its consolidated accounts with the UK Charity Commission and Companies House.
